#### Level 1 -Static & Timeless Content

Next, we move to the core theoretical foundation - the thinkers, theories, and concepts that never change in UPSC. This builds the backbone of Sociology Optional.

#### Level 2 - Sociological Perspectives on Contemporary Society

Here, we learn how to apply those theories to real-world changes - like digital life, gender roles, economy, and social movements understanding how Sociology explains modern India.

#### Level 3 - Current Affairs with a Sociological Lens

At this stage, we connect newspaper headlines, reports, and government policies with sociological ideas – building depth for Paper II and essay-style answers.

#### Level 4 - Previous Year Questions & Integration
